



Outings and District Events

The cubs love outings and this year our first outing was to Torryburn to practice fire lighting skills. After lighting fires in groups on the beach, the cubs toasted marshmallows, had a sausage sizzle and enjoyed some time at the play park.

This was followed by a fantastic day out at Aberdour Castle in the summer term, thanks to Historic Environment Scotland. We explored the castle with a castle challenge and watched a medieval construction science show. We then found out about the castle gardens and planted herbs which the cubs got to take home.

For our Christmas outing we all had a great time at the ten pin bowling.

Thanks to our leader, Mike, who got his permit to lead archery, the cubs enjoyed a morning at Limekilns scout hall trying out archery. After learning the basics they were all hitting the target in no time.

District events give the cubs the chance to meet cubs from other packs and this year our cubs have attended the annual district sports day, a DAFC football match and the safety competition which was held at the fire station. The cubs who went to this earned three badges – the home safety, fire safety and personal safety badges.

Age Range (10 – 14)

Scouts aims to build and develop young people's confidence, sense of adventure and outdoor skills, as well as encouraging them to explore their beliefs and attitudes and be creative. It offers them the independence to put these skills into practice at camps and even on international trips. Scouts are encouraged to work together and take the lead on all sorts of projects, from community-based work to planning games and activities for their meetings. The Scout Troop has tried to deliver this through a mix of training and personal development not only during the regular troop nights but also at weekends and other opportunities as available. Our programme is based around camping, outdoor activities, outings and expeditions on a regular basis. Scouts are encouraged to participate in these activities as much as possible but we are also conscious of the many other demands that are placed on them through academic and other personal pursuits. We try to provide an exciting and creative programme of events throughout the year as detailed below.

New Joiners – As well as Scouts who have joined from outside and the usual transition from Cubs we have also been pleased to welcome additional adult support with Dean taking on the role of Assistant Scout Leader and Darren as Section Assistant. This has not only provided some fresh ideas into our programme but also given us additional cover for troop week nights and weekend activities.

Challenge and Activity Awards – The core training programme for all Scouts is based around completion of 9 Challenge Awards to obtain the Chief Scout's Gold Award. The new Challenge Awards offer Scouts a number of options for activities to complete allowing greater flexibility for mixed abilities and interests. In addition, there are also the Activity Badges and Staged Awards which allow Scouts to recognise their individual interests both within and outside of Scouting. As part of the Chief Scout Award it is a requirement to earn 6 Activity or Staged badges to reflect the individual nature of each Scout's ability and interests. During the year we normally pursue a theme each term which provides the scouts with an opportunity to spend some time developing a given skill and should cover the requirements of at least one Challenge Award or Staged Badge. We also encourage Scouts to work on their own initiative to supplement the training provided on troop nights to gain additional levels of the Activity or Staged Badges. Most of the troop members who hadn't previously obtained them were able to gain their 1st or 2nd Stage Swimmers Award, Community Challenge Award and improve their overall fitness as well by completing the Athletics Activity Badge.

Outings and Visitors— Trips to external locations or external speakers visiting our troop night are also important to provide Scouts with an insight into our local and sometimes not so local community. Trips out this year included Bowlplex, Fordell Firs, Dunfermline Swimming Pool and Silver Sands Beach for our annual end of term beach party as well as visit to the hall covering Fire Safety. We also attended Church Parades this year for Remembrance Sunday and Founders Day. Joint activities with the Explorers on some events such as supporting Scotland Football Team at Hampden Park, skiing in Sweden, Winter Camp and survival camps all helped to provide the Scouts with an insight into some of the activities they can expect when they move up to Explorers.

Communications - One element of the programme that we have introduced is having at least one open evening each year for the parents and carers to attend and find out a little more about what goes on over the year. Previously we had completed a variety of Art projects using a different media. This year we had a Christmas Concert using Dean's musical skills and teaching to great effect. We also had displays during the evening of the projects we had worked on during the year including pioneering and Newspaper production. We also created a Facebook closed group for all parents and carers to join (along with any Scouts old enough) so that we can provide regular news and photos of each week's activity as well as advising of changes to the programme at short notice.

Expeditions and Camps – No year would be complete without camps and hikes and this year was no exception. We enjoyed weekend camps at Fordell Firs, 9 Acres as well as Limekilns Scout Hall as part of our 'Tour de West Fife' cycle and hiking weekend! We also held a summer camp split between Spean Bridge near Fort William and Staffin on the Isle of Skye. The weather was very kind to us and we covered activities including cycling, hill walking, visiting the Museum of Island Life on Skye, sightseeing and even some relaxation time on the beach watching Seals in the harbour at Staffin. Thanks to Shaun and Caleece, two of the Explorers who came along to help the leaders. Plans are already in progress for 2018 camp which will be in the Lake District on Lake Windermere.

District Events – Members of the troop took part in all the District Scout events this year. This included a mix of fun and sporting events like the Scout Raft Race and District Sports Day as well as some of the more traditional Scouting based competitive events such as the Gibb Bugle Camping Competition, Willie Robertson Trophy and Scout and Guide Quiz. There was also a new event on the calendar this year being the 6 a side Hockey Tournament which was organised by our troop with support from Dunfermline Carnegie Hockey Club. As noted last year, we had a large age gap from the older Scouts who moved up to Explorers and so the Patrol Leaders and Assistant Patrol Leaders have taken the year to grow into their roles. By entering teams in all competitions despite their relative inexperience, all those taking part have enjoyed the activity and most are keen to take part next year which is always a good sign by which they will have developed more experience.

Community and International – We have organised activities aimed at giving the Scouts an understanding and appreciation of their local and international community. This included litter picking in the village and on the old railway line towards Dunfermline. The older scouts have continued to support the Cub and Beaver sections as part of their community challenge and Saltire Awards. The international dimension was learning about Fairtrade, skiing in Sweden and talks from Explorers about their overseas expeditions.

My thanks:

Jim, Dean and Darren have been a great help this year, willingly offering their time on a regular basis. Parents have been great, not only in encouraging their children to attend but also in practical support via the weekly parental rota allowing them an insight into what the Scouts are up to. Lastly, it would be remiss not to recognise the support that the Executive have provided. Often unsung and largely hidden from view this support is integral to the success of the Troop and the Group overall. There are always opportunities for parents to assist by becoming the section rep on the Executive, or volunteering to help with the funding and running of the hall. If any parents feel they may be able to help with the Troop please let me know and I would be happy to discuss the various opportunities. Thanks for your support.

With nearly thirty active youngsters aged 14 to 17 it's always difficult to keep them busy; provide something to suit everyone; and ensure that we are contributing positively to their personal development, but we have tried and have had a busy year.

#skills for life are what our members achieve and this is partly through their participation in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme undertaking volunteering, physical activity, an expedition and skills over the year. However, in addition we try and prepare them for the world of work with relevant certification and this year we have undertaken Community Sports Leadership, First Aid and Elementary Food Hygiene.

Through our Intermediate Labour Market we employ the Explorers @ £5 per hour giving them valuable work experience undertaking catering for large events; event stewarding; marquee hire and leaflet/magazine distribution as well as providing the baggage service at many of Scotland's marathons and road races. We brought in nearly £18,000 over the year and ensured that the Explorers could pay for their activities and expeditions without relying on contributions from their parents. We can also provide employment references as required, based on their experience and expertise.

Youth Involvement also gives our members skills for life and we were delighted to be awarded our Foundation Level Youth Approved certificate from Scottish Headquarters. Each term the members discuss and decide what activities they'd like to do and each time that we organize a longer expedition abroad, the activities are based on the wishes of those who are participating. Equally, helping the younger sections as Young Leaders gives our members valuable skills and helps to develop their leadership potential. They use this volunteering towards their Duke of Edinburgh's and count the hours towards the Saltire Awards that recognize youth volunteering. We are delighted that so many of our members are willing to give up additional hours to help out at Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. The District has started a Youth Forum to ensure that young people's opinions are taken into account at that level as well as in their local Units and we are delighted that Caleece Albans volunteered to represent the 83rd.

During the year several of the Unit were selected to represent Dunfermline at this summer's International Patrol Jamborette at Blair Atholl and we wish Caleece Albans, Alec Davidson, Lyle Hopkins and Dylan Jack all the best as they camp with our friends from Sweden, Japan and Ecuador who are all attending the Jamborette in July. Everyone is welcome to come along to the visitors' day on Saturday 21st July from 1pm at Blair Castle.

Skiing in Sweden was once again very popular at both Easter and during the school February mid-term holiday, allowing us to further develop our links with the Scout Group in Malung who'll be visiting Scotland and Blair Atholl this summer. The snow this year was the deepest since the 1960's which made for excellent conditions on the slopes.

Last year's summer camp was at St Cyrus with a group of Explorers from Belgium. We had excellent weather and a great week of hiking, pioneering and visiting castles – particularly Dunottar and Crathes. In Fife, we cycled through Devilla and back through Culross, took the Chain Walk at Elie and visited the Kelpies. We finished with some time in Edinburgh and a visit to Ryze Trampoline Centre. They thoroughly enjoyed their time in Scotland and invited us to visit their home town in Belgium during our October Eurotour.

We visited Europe in October taking in Paris and the European Space Centre as well Europa Theme Park in Germany before doing some cave biking in the Netherlands. We then spent a delightful weekend in Peer, Belgium exploring the town and its surroundings before heading to Passchendaele to the World War One museum and trenches and learn about the events of a century before. We were able to trace some relatives and visit the graveyards before heading home. A very busy, but memorable week of activities.

We have participated in all District Explorer events and won the General Knowledge Quiz once again. We were also delighted that Caleece Albans and Lyle Hopkins were selected to represent East Scotland Region at the 2019 World Scout Jamboree in the USA. They have to raise nearly £4,000 each, so please support their efforts when you can.

Having received no new members from the Scouts for the past eighteen months, our membership is dropping, and to make some activities viable we are joining up with other Units from the District. With the oldest members turning 18 by the summer, we'll be down to our lowest membership since the Unit began in 2002, but will continue to provide a varied and exciting programme.

We are heading to Japan for this year's summer camp and have a very full three weeks planned including attending their National Jamboree and visiting Tokyo, Kyoto and Hiroshima as well as Iwate Prefecture as guests of the Scouts who'll visit Scotland in July.

Thanks to everyone that has helped over the past year – leaders, parents and Executive members. As always it's a pleasure to work with the Explorers and to help them gain Skills for Life.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Group is an unincorporated recognised Scottish Charity and is governed by the terms detailed in the constitution of The Scout Association (incorporated by Royal Charter in 1912) and as detailed in its Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) and as amended by its Scottish Variations. It is a member of The Scout Association having accepted the aims of the Association. The Group Council is the electoral body which supports scouting in the Scout Group. It is the body to which the Group Executive Committee is accountable.

The Group Council must hold an Annual General Meeting within six months of the financial year end to receive and consider the Annual Report of the Group Executive Committee, including the annual statement of accounts. The Group Council must approve the Group Scout Leader's nomination of the Group Chairman and nominated members of the Group Executive Committee, elect a Group Secretary and a Group Treasurer and elect certain members of the Group Executive Committee.

Members of the Executive Committee must act collectively as Charity Trustees in the best interests of its members to:

- Comply with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association
- Protect and maintain any property and equipment owned by and used by the Group
- Manage the Group finances.
- Provide insurance for people, property and equipment.
- Provide sufficient resources for Scouting to operate. This includes, but is not limited to, supporting recruitment, other adult support, and fundraising activities.
- Promote and support the development of Scouting in the local area.
- Manage and implement the Safety Policy locally
- Ensure that a positive image of Scouting exists in the local community.
- Appoint and manage the operation of any sub-Committees, including appointing Chairs to lead the sub-Committees.
- Ensure that Young People are meaningfully involved in decision making at all levels within the Group
- The opening, closure and amalgamation of Sections in the Group as necessary
- Maintain confidentiality with regard to appropriate Executive Committee business

Organisational Structure

The trustees meet 8 times a year and determine policy as well as reviewing finance and determining operational matters.

Recruitment, Appointment and Induction of Trustees

New trustees are recruited as and when required from existing and new contacts. Any newly appointed trustees are advised of the objectives and activities of the Group, and are to act in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association and the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 in force at the date of appointment. Assistance and training is provided to new trustees by the existing trustees and all new Office Bearers are trained and validated in Module 1 of The Scout Association's National Adult Training Scheme by Dunfermline District Scout Council. A full induction Pack is provided to new members covering:

- The obligations of the Trustees
- Funding and the current financial position as set out in the latest accounts.

There are no plans to alter the policies or change the objectives of the charity. Trustees receive an annual update on their responsibilities.

Ricks

The Group is dependent upon receiving sufficient funding and donations to enable it to continue to work towards achieving its objectives. The Committee has carried out an assessment of all the major risks (including those related to Health & Safety) and is satisfied that it has systems or procedures in place to manage those risks. All Leaders, regular helpers and Office Bearers must be members of the Protecting Vulnerable Groups (PVG) scheme or have had an enhanced Disclosure through The Scout Association from Disclosure Scotland within the past 5 years. All adult members have also undertaken and been validated for GDPR to ensure that all personal data held by the Group is done so securely and in line with the current legislation.

Objectives and Activities

The aim of the Group is to promote the purpose of Scouting which is that Scouting exists to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society. The Group is organised in line with the Values of Scouting which are that as Scouts we are guided by these values:

Integrity - We act with integrity; we are honest, trustworthy and loyal.

Respect - We have self-respect and respect for others.

Care - We support others and take care of the world in which we live.

Belief - We explore our faiths, beliefs and attitudes.

Co-operation - We make a positive difference; co-operate with others, make friends.

Volunteers

In addition to 22 uniformed leaders, approximately 20 parents of young people attending the Scout Group helped with various activities to raise funds or just to help out. It is difficult to put a monetary value on this input, but the results of our volunteer help can easily be appreciated.

Achievements and Performance

It has been another successful year for the Scout Group with all of our members progressing through the Award Scheme, gaining their Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum and Diamond Chief Scout's Awards as well as numerous Activity Badges. Each section has had its highlights and these are detailed earlier in the Annual Report.

The Group provides a programme of activities including progression through the various Scouting awards. We link what we do to the four capacities of the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence and try to develop successful learners; confident individuals; effective contributors; and responsible citizens. Where possible we ensure that our members are achieving a number of the experiences and outcomes set by the government. We provide activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Villages area, based in Cairneyhill, with a current membership of 95.

Scouting takes place when young people, in partnership with adults, work together based on the values of Scouting and:

- -enjoy what they are doing and have fun
- -take part in activities indoors and outdoors
- -learn by doing
- -share in spiritual reflection
- -take responsibility and make choices
- -undertake new and challenging activities
- -make and live by their Promise.

The Scout Group in Cairneyhill provides a community facility for the village that is regularly used by the After-School Club; Mothers & Toddlers; the Brownies; the Youth Club; Karate and Dance Groups; Dog Training Classes, Football Teams and for one—off lets. It is also used as a Polling Station for all elections. We also provide two 17-seater minibuses that are regularly used by a variety of local groups from playgroups to groups of those who are retired and manage an 8-seater minibus for Fife Council for use by those throughout the West Fife Villages. Scouting in Cairneyhill is most definitely a part of the community, not apart from the community, and will continue to support others in the future.

Financial Review

The Statement of Financial Activities shows net deficit for the year of £9,835 (2017 – net deficit £15,978). A total of £257,908 was retained in accumulated funds at the year-end (2017 – £267,743).

Reserves Policy


The Group Executive Committee have agreed that the level of free reserves, being the unrestricted and designated funds, excluding the Stewart Hall Trust Fund and the Mini bus funds, which are required to sustain operations in the event of unforeseen adverse future financial events should be a minimum of three months operating costs. Free reserves at 31 March 2018 amounted to £68,140 and this meets the current requirements.

Investment Policy

Surplus funds are held in bank accounts during the year.

Plans for the Future

The Group remains committed to providing an exciting programme of activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Village area.



Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements:

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant information of which the independent examiner is unaware and;
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant information and to establish that the independent examiner is aware of the information.

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation and Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the Notes to these financial statements. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice:

Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their Accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 (effective January 2015), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

The charity meets the definition of a public entity under FRS 102.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Fund Accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows-Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objectives of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designed as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations

Donations are recognised when the charity has evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably. Entitlement usually arises immediately on receipt, however, in the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Liabilities are measured on recognition at historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. The exception is that certain financial instruments must be adjusted to their present value; these include financial liabilities where settlement is deferred for more than 12 months after the reporting date.

All expenditure is accounted for an accruals basis. All expenses include support costs and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Expenditure (contd)

Certain costs which are attributable to more than one activity, namely hall costs and minibus costs and related depreciation, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of 25% of total costs incurred to trading activities and 75% of total costs incurred to charitable activities on those activities.

Expenditure on Charitable Activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by the charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its benefitaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities. The costs of charitable activities presented in the Statement of Financial Activities includes the costs of both direct service provision and the payments of grant awards if applicable.

Governance costs

Governance costs (which are included as a component of support costs in accordance with SORP) comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include those related to constitutional and statutory requirements, external scrutiny (audit or independent examination), strategic management, and other legal and professional fees.

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.

Cash at Bank and in Hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term liquid investments with a short maturity of three months from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and Provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Judgements and estimates

In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to make estimates and assumptions which affect reported income, expenses and liabilities. Use of available information and application of judgement are inherent in the formation of estimates, together with past experience and expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results in the future could differ from such estimates.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Fixed Assets

Heritable Property is recorded at cost and Motor Vehicles are recorded at cost or donated value. Equipment has been recorded at a value based on a percentage of estimated replacement cost due to the absence of original cost details. Items older then five years old are written down by 50% and items under five years old have been written down by 10% with the resultant total treated as the cost equivalent.

New equipment under £2,000 is written off in the year of acquisition.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful life of that asset as follows:

Heritable Property - 2% straight line per annum

Equipment

- 20% reducing balance per annum

Motor Vehicles - 25% reducing balance per annum
