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Secretary's Statement

Following another successful year for the 83rd Fife (Cairneyhill) Scout Group our members have continued to enjoy a programme of activities including progression through the various Scouting awards schemes and have gained numerous activity badges. The Group, based in Cairneyhill remains committed to providing an exciting programme of activities for those aged 6-25 from around the West Fife Villages area with a current membership of 103 members.

This year has seen the 83rd Fife (Cairneyhill) Scout Group celebrate its 40th anniversary and a celebratory group camp for all our sections is being arranged for early September this year. The group camp will be held at the Fordell Firs facility in Dunfermline with an exciting programme of activities and events on offer (details to be confirmed).

All Sections have continued to meet indoors and outdoors when able and activities have included cycling, pancake making, map reading, golfing, quizzes, Burns Night celebrations, building fires, community woodland clearing, challenges, building bird boxes, caving, experiencing other cultures and foods, climbing walls and hills to mention a few. More recently there have been local camps and some of the Scouts and Explorers have travelled to Windermere. Sweden. Switzerland. Germany, South Korea and Seoul for the World Scout Jamboree 2023. Please have a look at the section reports to find out the range of other activities the young people have been involved in over the year.

This would have been impossible if it wasn't for all our volunteers, leaders and parent helpers who give up their time to support the Sections and our Group's management committee. It is hoped we can recruit additional adult volunteers in the year ahead to strengthen our team in each of the four Sections, on our Management Committee and the Group Executive.

Please consider if you may be able to help support our Group. At present we require to recruit a Chair, Treasurer, Hall Maintenance and parent representatives for Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and **Explorers.** Monthly meetings are held on a Sunday evening for an hour and are very informal.

There are also opportunities for new **Section Leaders**. Leaders are supported through training in programme delivery, child protection and safety. The structured programmes have a variety of activities, ideas and challenges to pick from and build the weekly meeting around. Leaders can be male or female and are over 18 years of age, so maybe you, a family member or friend could volunteer in the age group that suits you.

Volunteering is a fantastic way to meet new people and can help strengthen job applications by building on personal skills like teamwork, confidence and leadership. Full support is given for all roles. Please drop me an email if you wish further information. The more help that is offered, the more your young people will benefit.

The more you find out about the Scouting movement across the world the more you understand how amazing it is to be part of such a fantastic organisation, inspiring generations of young people to reach their potential and learn skills for life.

Finally, can we extend our thanks to all our current Leaders and volunteers for the learning and development opportunities that they offer our members as they progress through the sections. Scouting in Cairneyhill is most definitely a part of the community and we will continue to support our members to gain skills for life through progressive training awards and badges. The **Platinum Chief Scout's Award** is the first award in the Explorer Scout Section and is comparable to the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award.



Our numbers have stayed static throughout the year at 30 Beavers and we still have a waiting list of others eager to join us. We are very short of uniformed leaders, but are very grateful for all the parents taking their turn on our rota to ensure that we always have at least one adult for every 6 youngsters.

Summer Term 2022 saw the Beavers out and about hiking around Preston Island and across the Forth Road Bridge as well as helping plant the flower tubs outside the Scout Hall. We had a visit from West Fife Mini Professors to complete the Experiment Badge.

After the Summer we heard about their holidays, achieved the Cook's and Emergency Aid Badges, had lots of games chosen by the oldest ones moving up to Cubs and our end of term outing was to Innoflate in Livingston.

After the October holidays we continued our everpopular fires and cooking nights when sausages and marshmallows are heated and consumed. We celebrated St Andrews Night, completed our Communicator Badge, visited Dunfermline Fire Station and had a Christmas Crafts evening. We finished off the term with an outing to the Trampoline Centre at Alloa.

We had a very busy term at the start of 2023 with "23" challenges and then Burns' Night, Chinese New Year and Pancake Day involved lots of food. We had a movie and chips night and a Swedish night when we tasted sweets and juice and saw what the Explorers had been doing on their midterm ski expedition there. We completed our Builders' Badge with a junk modelling night when they created some amazing things.

Our weekly programme allows the Beavers to complete the necessary requirement for their various challenge awards and to gain some activity badges. They can also work on activity badges at home and in other clubs that they are members of. We couldn't unfortunately offer any residentials during the past year due to a shortage of adult leaders, but we'll have our Group Camp in September and hope to arrange some sleepovers inside during the winter months.

A huge thank you to our Young Leaders without whom we really couldn't have coped – they come along each week, undertaking the volunteering element of their Scouting and Duke of Edinburgh's Awards and run games as well as bases for the Beavers on whatever the night's theme is.

Final thanks is to Karen Sapsed who acts as the Treasurer for the Beavers (another willing volunteer who gives her time to chase up Subs, submit GiftAid claims and make all the necessary payments). This frees up the Leaders time to organise the weekly meetings and complete the necessary risk assessments so that we can keep all your youngsters safe and sound.

Our Cub Pack has had another busy year, packed with lots of games and activities – some counting towards badge work and some just for fun. Our numbers have stayed steady throughout the year at

between 24 and 27 cubs, which is enough for the number of leaders we have had.

We have had a few changes to our leadership team throughout the year, with Paul leaving at the end of the summer term due to work commitments, Ann leaving in the Autumn term when her son went up to Scouts and our parent helpers, Claire and Kai unable to come along due to work commitments as well. We were lucky enough to welcome Tolkien and Kaitlyn into our pack as Section Assistants in the Autumn term and they were a great asset until they had to leave in the last term when they both moved away for University. Thank you to all of them for making the cub pack a success.

We began our summer term with an Easter themed evening and the cubs decorated an easter egg (with prizes for the best ones) and took part in an egg drop challenge in small teams. Ann organised the gardener Badge and the cubs planted their own lettuce, beetroot, carrot and herb seeds and were challenged to look after them and keep a record of their growth. The cubs went on to work on their outdoor skills by learning how to use a compass and fire lighting (with marshmallows, of course) at the nearby woods. Five of our Cubs – Ryan, Leia, Remi, Scott & Caitlyn volunteered themselves to represent our cub pack in the Dunfermline District Mowgli Shield competition, which is a test of their Scouting skills and included knots, tracking, compass

bearings, pioneering and first aid. They had a great day and received a certificate in recognition of their achievement. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

inspired us to have a small celebration in the hall with cakes which the cubs decorated. We also decorated top hats to take with us to the District Cub event later that month. Don Yard, ADC Cubs (who sadly passed away in June 2023) organised a celebratory event at Fordell Firs during which we enjoyed a scavenger hunt, sausage sizzle, hat competition and the lighting of a beacon. The Platinum Jubilee also gave a few of the Cubs the opportunity to plant a tree in the grounds of the local church. This was followed by the group AGM at which the cubs attending had a shot of the climbing wall, making and flying air powered rockets (thanks Paul) and a water games night.

Our science teacher leader, Paul, organised an outing to the Glasgow Science Centre and the cubs had a great day exploring the hands-on exhibits, being shown real meteorites and the exciting model of a nuclear reaction. Thanks to Paul for organising the trip and Paul, Ann and Amy for leading a group of cubs around the centre. The Cubs also took part in the Cairneyhill Gala Day parade and did a great job with their cowboy costumes, earning us a first place in the walking groups.

The Autumn term saw the cubs enjoying the trampoline and table tennis, continue our journey with learning the points of the compass (made easier by being able to eat the compass donut afterwards) and Ann's Cub Café where the cubs took turns at taking orders and serving up toast and hot chocolate. This was a popular activity amongst the cubs and one which we will be sure to repeat next year. The rest of the weeks of this term were

The cubs who hadn't already earned their Musician badge earned it when Tolkien ran a noisy and fun music evening. He taught the cubs how to play a few notes on a guitar and a ukelele and brought his drum box for the cubs to make some noise with. The eldest cubs earned their Chef badge this term with Tolkien and Kaitlyn helping them to plan a menu and make nachos, pizza and pancakes. It looked delicious and the cubs enjoyed eating it all. After a traditional Christmas craft evening (thanks go to Debbie who ran the biscuit icing base), the cubs enjoyed an end of term party with the fabulous Mick Magic and a visit from Santa.

The Spring term brought a Burns Night celebration – the cubs tasted some haggis, neeps and tatties and baked their own tartan shortbread. Most of the cubs were brave enough to recite the Scottish poems they had learnt at school which was good entertainment.

and attitudes and be creative. It offers them the independence to put these skills into practice at camps and even on international trips.

Through youth led example we encourage Scouts to have a say in planning and developing the activities and projects they want to take part in, giving them the chance to put their teamwork and leadership skills into practice. Scouts are encouraged to work together and take the lead on their own programme.

Challenge and Activity Awards – The core training programme for all Scouts is based around completion of 9 Challenge Awards to obtain the Chief Scout's Gold Award.

Much of the programme set to accomplish these

awards rely on patrol activity, camping and other residential events so again these have now started to improve this year. The Scouts completed approximately 75 challenge, staged and activity awards this year.

We were also pleased to award the Gold Chief Scouts Award to Fergus Dove at last year's AGM. This is the highest award to be earned by Scouts before they move to Explorers.

Outings and Visitors – This year we have been able to meet all year without restrictions and the programme has returned to a more traditional pattern.

We managed a trip across the Forth Road Bridge, cycling the disused railway line to Alloa, fishing at Balmule, swimming at Grangemouth Pool, rafting at Townhill Lock, Church Parade for Founder's Day and Remembrance Sunday as well as compulsory visits to Hilton Woods for cooking! No year would be complete without our trip for Aberdour's Silver Sands beach for the end of year party and this year was no exception. Some of the braver scouts even swimming despite it not being the warmest day this year.

Several Scouts also attended some of the Scotland World Cup qualifying games at Hampden Park this year.

Expeditions and Camps – Due to leader availability and illness (getting Covid on the eve of the Strathaven Camp) expeditions and camps were limited this year. We did have a team enter the Gibb Bugle competition and also, 4 Scouts joined with 7 Explorers at the Blair Atholl Satellite Camp in July. This is good introduction to International Scouting and a great preparation for those who want to go on to apply for the full Jamborette once they are old enough.

Community and International – as well as the Satellite Camp, five Scouts were able to join the Explorers in the skiing expedition to Malung in Sweden in February. Despite the trials and tribulations of the return journey it didn't dampen their appetite for next year! Thanks to Sue for getting the Scouts home safely.

We have continued our support for environmental and community activities, including beach cleaning,

path building in Culross and clearance work with West Fife Woodland. For the second year running we created Christmas cards for residents in four local care homes which were very much appreciated by the staff and residents who don't have any family able to visit.

We had an interesting evening with Come Forth for Wildlife at the Cowdenbeath Wetland where wee learnt more about the work undertaken to preserve and manage the wetland areas as well as each Scout then making a 'bug hotel' which were put up around the area.

Thanks - We are still without an Assistant Scout Leader so the troop remains reliant on the help from the Section Assistants. Thanks to Jade, Jane and Julie for their continued support throughout the year. We have also been very ably supported this year by Sophie who is working with the Scouts as part of her degree course. Thanks also to the parents who have turned up to support the weekly programme when we have needed a bit more help some evenings.

There are always opportunities for parents to assist either to in several roles on the Executive Committee or on a more regular basis to support the Troop. There are also opportunities for ad-hoc volunteering to help support the funding and running of the hall. If any parents feel they may be able to undertake any additional support with the Troop, please let me know and I am happy to discuss the various ways in which this support can be given.

Lastly, it would be remiss not to recognise the support that both the Executive and other uniformed leaders within the Group have provided this year. Often unsung and hidden from view this support is integral to the success of the Troop and the Group overall.

Thanks for your support as we have returned to more predictable times. I'm sure all the Scouts are really looking forward to 2023-2024 year when we hope to have a proper Summer Camp which has been missing over the last three years.

It's been another busy year - 2022 celebrated 20 years of Explorers in the UK and here in Cairneyhill and looking back we've done so much in that period and 2023 is the 40th Anniversary of the Scout Group here in the village and again we've developed and achieved so much over that period. We have participated in a huge variety of national and District activities over the year including the Almost Haunted Halloween weekend at Meggernie to the Frozen Fifers camp at Nineacres. We were once again victorious in the District Explorer Quiz Competition – well done.

Outdoor & Adventure: We've continued climbing munros across Scotland as well as lots of local hikes along the West Fife Woodland Way, Fife Pilgrims' Way, local hills and on the Coastal Path. We've mountain biked at Glentress and cycled around Loch Leven. We've kayaked, canoed and paddleboarded at Lochore Meadows and climbed regularly in the Scout Hall. We've skied at Hillend as well as our week in Sweden.

Community Service: We've worked closely with West Fife Woodland Group and undertaken a number of environmental projects locally within Valleyfield Woods, along the beaches locally and at Valleyfield Community Garden. We've cut back vegetation, moved snowdrops, created paths and cleared mountains of litter. Great work everyone. Throughout the year we've provided a marquee hire service to local organisations and this has brought in much-needed funds.

Skills: During the winter nights we've undertaken a variety of activities from Bob Ross painting nights to cooking either inside or up the woods. We've played badminton and table-tennis and undertaken What3Words exercises around the village. Individually, everyone completes a personal

skill for their awards and there is a wide range from bookbinding to cooking being undertaken.

International: We had a very successful EuroTour in the summer of 2022 (a last-minute replacement for our cancelled visit to Japan) with the first week visiting the war graves and Menin Gate in Belgium; Cave-Biking in Netherlands; a day at the European Space Centre and a day at Walibi Theme Park. The second week was based in Austria visiting Dachau Concentration Camp and the BMW factory in Munich; hiking up to the Eagles' Nest; visiting the Red Bull Experience and the old town of Salzburg as well as swimming in the nearby lake and riding the mountain coaster. Our Snowsports week in Sweden went well until the flight home was cancelled. Alternative arrangements were made (at a cost, which to date still haven't been refunded by Ryanair). Plans are in hand for a Eurotour in the summer of 2023 to France, Germany and Switzerland and a visit to the national parks on the West Coast of USA in October 2023. We are also looking forward to welcoming our International friends to Blair Atholl in the summer of 2024 and to hearing all about Sophie's adventures at the 2023 World Scout Jamboree in South Korea.

Thanks to everyone who has helped over the past year – leaders, parents and Executive members. As always, it's a pleasure to work with the Explorers and to help them gain Skills for Life.

Keeping young people safe

It's everyone's responsibility

All adults in Scouts follow our code of behaviour

- **Do** remember that you are a role model at ALL times, inside and outside Scouting. Set a good example for others to follow
- **Do** treat everyone with dignity and respect in line with the Scouting Values
- **Do** treat all young people equally do not show favouritism
- Do follow the adult-to-young person ratios at all times
- **Do** remember that you have been placed in a position of trust do not abuse this
- Do report all allegations, suspicions and concerns immediately
- **Do** remember that someone may misinterpret your actions
- Do respect a young person's right to personal privacy
- Do act within appropriate boundaries, even in difficult circumstances
- **Do** encourage an open and transparent culture, where people can challenge inappropriate attitudes or behaviours
- **Do** make everyone (young people, parents and carers, Young Leaders and other helpers) aware of our safeguarding arrangements and share our Yellow Card our Code of Behaviour
- **Do** create an environment where young people feel safe to voice their concerns
- **Do** have separate sleeping accommodation for young people, adults and Young Leaders working with a younger section
- **Do** plan activities that involve more than one other person being present, or at least within sight and hearing of others

Do not plan to be alone with a young person

Do not drink alcohol when you are directly responsible for young people and never allow young people on Scouting activities to drink alcohol

Do not trivialise abuse or let it go unreported

Do not join in physical contact games with young people

Do not overstep the boundaries between yourself and young people by engaging in friendships or sexual relationships

Do not allow activities that encourage bullying behaviour including initiation ceremonies, dares or forfeits

Do not use inappropriate, suggestive or threatening language, whether verbal, written or online

Do not rely on your reputation or position to protect you

If a young person is at immediate risk of harm call the police on 999 and then tell your Group Scout Leader or District Commissioner.

Young people

We want everyone in Scouts to be safe and happy. If an adult has made you feel bad or uncomfortable, either inside or outside of Scouts, please tell a leader or your parents/carer. We will listen to you and take you seriously.

Parents

If you are worried about a young person, or if you have concerns about an adult involved in Scouts, please tell a Leader or District Commissioner immediately.

STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The Group is an unincorporated recognised Scottish Charity and is governed by the terms detailed in the constitution of The Scout Association (incorporated by Royal Charter in 1912) and as detailed in its Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) and as amended by its Scottish Variations. It is a member of The Scout Association having accepted the aims of the Association.

Appointment of Trustees

New trustees are recruited in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) of The Scout Association as and when required from existing and new contacts. Any newly appointed trustees are advised of the objectives and activities of the Group, and are to act in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association and the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 in force at the date of appointment. Assistance and training is provided to new trustees by the existing trustees and all new Office Bearers are trained and validated in 5 Modules of The Scout Association's National Adult Training Scheme – Essential Information, Trustee Introduction, GDPR, Safety and Safeguarding. A full Induction Pack is provided to new members covering:

- The obligations of the Trustees
- Funding and the current financial position as set out in the latest accounts.

Trustees receive an annual update on their responsibilities.

Organisational Structure

The trustees meet 8 times a year and determine policy as well as reviewing finance and determining operational matters.

Risk Assessment

The Group is dependent upon receiving sufficient funding and donations to enable it to continue to work towards achieving its objectives. The Committee has carried out an assessment of all the major risks (including those related to Health & Safety) and is satisfied that it has systems or procedures in place to manage those risks. All Leaders, regular helpers and Office Bearers must be members of the Protecting Vulnerable Groups (PVG) scheme or have had an enhanced Disclosure through The Scout Association from Disclosure Scotland within the past 5 years. All adult members have also undertaken and been validated for GDPR to ensure that all personal data held by the Group is done so securely and in line with the current legislation. All adults are also required to complete Safety and Safeguarding Training every three years. During the past year the Group has had to create and have approved Covid-19 Risk Assessments in order to return to face-to-face Scouting outdoors and indoors. These are reviewed monthly and updated in line with changing government guidance. In addition, since January 2021 written risk assessments are in place for every activity being undertaken by each Section of the Scout Group.

OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES

The aim of the Group is to promote the purpose of Scouting which is that Scouting exists to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society. The Group is organised in line with the Values of Scouting which are that as Scouts we are guided by these values:

Integrity - We act with integrity; we are honest, trustworthy and loyal.

Respect - We have self-respect and respect for others.

Care - We support others and take care of the world in which we live.

Belief - We explore our faiths, beliefs and attitudes.

Co-operation - We make a positive difference; co-operate with others, make friends.

Volunteers

In addition to 18 uniformed leaders, approximately 25 parents of young people attending the Scout Group helped with various activities to raise funds or just to help out. It is difficult to put a monetary value on this input, but the results of our volunteer help can easily be appreciated.

ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

It has been another successful year for the Scout Group with all of our members progressing through the Award Scheme, as well as gaining numerous Activity Badges. Each section has had its highlights and these are detailed earlier in the Annual Report. The Group provides a programme of activities including progression through the various Scouting awards. We link what we do to the four capacities of the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence and try to develop successful learners; confident individuals; effective contributors; and responsible citizens. Where possible we ensure that our members are achieving a number of the experiences and outcomes set by the government. We provide activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Villages area, based in Cairneyhill, with a current membership of 103.

The Scout Group in Cairneyhill provides a community facility for the village that is normally regularly used by the Primary School; Mothers & Toddlers; the Brownies; the Youth Club; Karate and Dance Groups; Adult Exercise Classes; Football Teams and for one–off lets. It is used as a Polling Station for elections. We also provide two 17-seater minibuses that are normally regularly used by a variety of local groups from playgroups to groups of those who are retired. Scouting in Cairneyhill is most definitely a part of the community, not apart from the community, and will continue to support others in the future.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Overview

The accounts show a net deficit for the year of £1,300. (2022 – net deficit £10,771).

Charitable Expenditure in this financial year

The impact of the rise in energy costs on the Group was limited to an extent the use of Fixed Term supply contracts, these have now expired however the ongoing costs are manageable. The group has also been impacted by increased costs for cleaning, insurance, etc., which is the 83rds part of the well reported Cost of Living increases. On a more positive note, the significant costs of minibus repairs incurred in previous years have been reduced resulting in a surplus of approximately £5k for the Group. Hall Hires have seen a return to pre-Covid levels, generating income of £5.2k. The costs this year for building maintenance have been

minimal, allowing the Group to reduce overall outgoings. The 83rd are well placed to continue to operate on a sound financial basis.

Reserves Policy

The Group Executive Committee have agreed that the level of free reserves that are required to sustain operations in the event of unforeseen adverse future financial events should be a minimum of three months operating costs. Free reserves as at 31 March 2023 amounted to £25,347 (2022: £31,151) and this exceeds the current requirements.

FUTURE PLANS

The Group remains committed to providing an exciting programme of activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Villages area, helping them gain skills for life through progressive training awards and badges. We hope to recruit additional adult volunteers in the year ahead to strengthen our leadership teams in each of the four Sections and on our Management Committee, the Group Executive.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of 83rd Fife (Cairneyhill) Scout Group

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023, which are set out on pages 16 to 20.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner
